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Words from the ICME President

Dear ICME collegues,

ICOM's 18th general conference in Melbourne in October 1998 was a great success, and perhaps especially so for ICME. Partly because Gaye Sculthorpe of Museum Victoria did a fabulous job in preparing the ICME sessions and excursions, partly because the "natural" themes for Australia and neighbouring countries - rights of minority indigenous populations, repatriation, illicit traffic, using museums for crosscultural cooperation and understanding - fitted ICME perfectly. Let me again on behalf of ICME thank Gaye for the pleasantly, seemingly effortlessly, but nevertheless hard work she put down in order to make ICME at Melbourne 1998 function so well.

The best report of a conference is to read the papers presented, and we hope that they will be available for you before long through a separate publication.

I feel that each ICME meeting have given me something particular that have been useful for me; either given a deeper understanding of the possibilities of museums, or insights and ideas that concretely have changed the way I work. What did we do in the last triannial period? In 1996 we visited and learned about the National Museum of Man in Bhopal that did not see itself as a caretaker of disappearing cultures, but as an active co-operator with living indigenous communities all over India. In 1997

we met in the Netherlands, visited loads of museums and talked: talked about the exhibitions we saw, discussed, criticised, exchanged experiences and viewpoints, enjoyed. Melbourne 1998 have been credited above. What will we do for the coming two years, before we meet at ICOM's general conference in Barcelona in 2001?

Already before Melbourne, we received an invitation to go to Mexico in 1999 and the invitation was accepted by the boar I. The themes for the conference will be decided in cooperation with collegues from Mexico. Outside ICOMs general conferences, it will be the first ICME meeting in Latin America for many years, perhaps ever (ICME has excisted since 1948, and I must confess my ignorance about ICME's history before this last decade).

And where do we start the new century, in 2000? Africa and the theme of illicit traffic have been mentioned by some. Certainly a relevant theme in a "coming" continent.

But first: Welcome to Mexico!
